



Whichever, there is an important behind-the-scenes person who oversees printing, addressing, and mailing the hardcopy newsletters to the roughly half our members who prefer that medium. Thanks also to our thirty-one Proctors and Proctors-In-Training who haven't had much to do since March. As Milton wrote, "they also serve who only stand in wait." Your friendly introduction to American Mensa is our best gateway for new members. Unfortunately, state, and local health regulations have virtually shut down most of our testing sessions. The good news is that at last, after years of effort, we're able to begin electronic testing as a supplement to what our Proctors have been doing and will do in our future.

This will not be "online testing" like our practice test. No low-security testing from someone's living room sofa. Instead, candidates will sit for what we're calling "a private test" at a secured (and cleaned) professionally-run testing center. They'll find that center and make an appointment using the same "Test sessions near your ZIP code" online search facility they now use on our website to find the (considerably less expensive) Local Group tests. By the time you read this, we'll have had the benefit of a couple of weeks of shake-down and Q&A via Mensa Connect's Proctor Officers Community. Details are evolving. Check the latest in the article and accompanying Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) page at us.mensa.org/featured-content/announcing-private-testing/.

As I'm sure you've noticed, the texture of the Mensa experience is changing because of our perfect storm of pandemic, social and economic disruption. One indicator – I'm getting notifications of nation-wide video conference "speaker meetings" hosted by Local Groups as distant as San

Francisco Region Mensa and Central Florida Mensa. I sat in on a SFRM presentation by one of my favorite science-fiction authors. Watch for announcements on Mensa Connect.

My first exposure to Mensa was at exactly such an event, and I immediately liked the members. I also thought it was a good marketing strategy, and I did avail myself of a free meal. It just seemed a bit homier and more personal to share some food with potential future relationships the first time out.

Notes to the Editor: POWER OF NAME Gordon Bakken

What is in a name? A rose by any other name might smell the same, but if it was named *manure*, your opinion of barnyard odor might negatively influence your opinion of the rose.

Likewise, the name given to any object, if it is the same or like the name of another known object, helps to influence one's opinion of the object being named. *Samsonite* luggage seems strong and *Dairy Queen* ice cream seems regal. These names are not accidental. They are intended to play on our prejudices.

Those naming political operations know how this works also. It is not a coincidence that the national security act has the abbreviation *P.A.T.R.I.O.T.*, or that the IRS is called a *Service* and the military is called the *Defense* (not *Attack*) *Department*. Being able to name your own operations favorably helps them gain acceptance. Being able to name your opponent's operations unfavorably helps them be rejected.

An example that illustrates this is the word *terrorist*. Recently I noticed that I had only heard it applied to those we oppose, although we have used the tactic ourselves. For example, Hiroshima was an effort to terrorize Japan into surrender. The bombing of Dresden in WWII was an effort to terrorize the Germans. Despite these obvious acts of terror on our part - and many more - I have never heard any of them referred to them by that name. We favor our friends also, when we speak of the fighting between the Muslim *terrorists* and the Israeli *Defense Forces*.

The concept is similar to the term *WMD*'s (Weapons of Mass Destruction). Strangely, the only nation that I hear has those is North Korea. Iran and Iraq seem to be thinking about obtaining them, but the USA, Israel, England, and France don't have them. They only have *Defense Arsenals*.

Another example comes from the cold war. The World Socialists gave names to both sides. They called their side *Communism*. Nice name. It sounds like *community* or *commune*. It sounds warm, like something we would all like to be part of. They named the other side *Capitalism*. (Technically a *Capitalist* is someone who makes money from his money, without having to work.) It was easy to convince the workers that this was unfair. A more accurate name for our system would have been *Free Market*. That is kind of a nice name, like *Communism*. It sounds like something one might want to be part of. Some tried to label our system thusly, but the Communists won and today even we usually call ourselves by the name our enemy gave us, *Capitalists*.

The last example of the naming battle that I will mention is that between the pro- and anti-abortionists. Both tried to label the other side, but in that, they were both unsuccessful. The Anti-Abortionists tried to name their opponents *Abortionists* and even *Baby Killers*. The Abortionists tried to label their opponents *Anti-Abortionist* or *Anti-Choice*, none of those names stuck. *Pro-Life* and *Pro-Choice* did.

And the battle goes on.
